Howdy!

It's hard to believe the sun is already setting on 2019. As I reflect on everything that we've experienced this year I continue to be thankful for Scouting and optimistic about our future. This year more than 37,000 youth were Scouts, and they earned thousands of merit badges, completed thousands of hours in community service, and probably ate thousands of pancakes too. Scouting continues to be the largest character-based youth serving agency in Arizona and the United States.

In Yuma recently, I had the opportunity to have lunch with Governor (and former Scout!) Doug Ducey. He shared with me and our group how important Scouting is to our community and state, and how our state's future needs Scouting. It is validating to see how relevant Scouting is to our elected leaders.

Several exciting and fun programs are right around the corner – Winter Day Camp and National Youth Leader Training (NYLT). Winter Day Camp is for Cub Scouts and will take place at the Heard Scout Pueblo. NYLT is offered multiple times throughout the year and is the gold standard in youth leadership training for members of Venturing and Scouts BSA. When I'm asked by troop and crew leaders how they can improve their units, I always ask how many of their members have completed NYLT (and how many of their leaders have completed Wood Badge!). NYLT builds leadership in youth and strengthens units.

If you've not yet signed up for Summer Camp, there's still time! Camps R-C and Geronimo still have room and we're planning for 2020 to be the best year yet at both camps; several new programs will be offered at both camps. Don't miss out on a great week of Scouting fun and adventure. If your troop has plans to attend a high adventure base or other summer camp away from Arizona, you might consider sending your first year Scouts to Geronimo, as sometimes the first years (or their parents) prefer to stay closer to home for their first summer camp. Also, if you have Scouts who are unable to attend summer camp with your troop, we can accommodate them at Geronimo on a different week – don't let your Scouts miss out!

Our new Friends of Scouting (FOS) implementation plan for units is rolling out now and into January. You'll find it is simpler and aligns with BSA and IRS guidelines. The messaging is consistent across the council and units will find it easier to achieve their goals and move on to further Scouting adventures. More details are in this edition.

During 2019, a large and diverse group of Scouters worked on a new vision for Scouting in Grand Canyon Council, resulting in a 20-year vision for Scouting and our council. Under the leadership of Judy Walden, this 20-year vision resulted in a set of 5 year goals — our new 5 year Strategic Plan, which will become our guiding document in 2020. Be sure to read the information in this edition to learn more about how our council and districts are changing their focus and efforts to align to our new Strategic Plan. This exciting new direction will lead us to serve more youth and communities than ever before!

As always, thank you for your involvement in Scouting. At this time of annual reflection, I am reminded of the significant investments we all make – investment of time, talent, and treasure – to provide Scouting to youth. These life changing experiences only occur when we are fully invested and working cooperatively on behalf of the young people who desire to be Scouts.

ANNOUNCING THE 2020-2024 STRATEGIC PLAN

In March of 2018, a large group of Scouters converged at the Scout Service Center to begin the process of envisioning our future – the future of Grand Canyon Council and Scouting in Arizona. This group included parents, unit leaders, district leaders, and council leaders. Board members and a couple staff rounded out the group. We had stakeholders who have spent decades in Scouting alongside people who had only a year of involvement. We had men and women, Scouters of various ethnic and religious backgrounds, and geographic diversity. And, we had fun brainstorming our future!

The result of that group's effort was a set of seven 'vision goals' that define how we want to be defined in 20 years:

- 1. Families will look first to Scouting for leadership and character development
- 2. Every youth will have the opportunity to participate and have meaningful growth experiences
- 3. We will serve 65,000 youth
- 4. We will fully endow our operational overhead
- 5. We will contribute annually \$2,000,000 for property improvements
- 6. We will have 100% of our adult volunteers engaged and trained
- 7. Scouting will be the #1 provider of service to our communities

From these goals, work ensued to answer the question "what do we need to accomplish in the next five years to be on track to achieve our vision goals?" The result was a set of strategies and specific goals that revolve around 4 key areas of activity: Membership, Program, Human Capital, and Fund Development.

Membership

Ambition: Continuous growth and retention of our membership

Key Strategies:

- Build and strengthen relationships with community partners, existing charter partners and the educational community
- 2. Create a culture of unit growth supported by appropriate volunteer and staff leadership
- 3. Provide timely relevant resources to volunteers empowering them to welcome all youth and families into a fun, welcoming environment

Metrics:

- 1. By 2019 develop a Council Coordinated Recruiting Plan
- 2. By 2020 develop and deliver training on fall recruiting plans such as "Join Scouting Nights" to maximize youth/adult recruitment for all units
- 3. By 2021 develop a program for training packs to execute a high quality "Back to Pack Night" in late summer and serve as an adult recruitment strategy
- 4. By 2020 and every year thereafter, every unit will coordinate a recruiting event using the Council Coordinated Recruiting Plan
- 5. By 2020 unit retention will increase 10% and will remain above 90% thereafter
- 6. Beginning 2020 we will grow our number of units by 10% annually
- 7. Beginning 2020, emphasize the Exploring Program resulting in 10% annual membership growth



Program

Ambition: Deliver attractive, relevant programs that will be deemed best choice for youth leadership development.

Key Strategies:

- 1. Develop a proactive media strategy to establish a significant presence in our community and promote Scouting as a safe, inclusive place for everyone
- 2. Develop a helpful hub of resources to support units
- 3. Offer robust and exciting programs appropriate to all membership levels
- 4. Establish comprehensive properties plan in support of program and financial needs

Metrics:

- 1. By 2021 using technology, develop helpful, relevant, readily available, and easily accessible resources that are reviewed and updated annually to support units
- 2. Beginning 2021 increase youth advancement and camp attendance by 3% per year
- 3. By 2020 develop a plan to promote and provide civic service opportunities for units
- 4. By 2020 develop a media relations strategy (including unit tools) resulting in at least two positive publicity items per month
- 5. By 2021 develop an evaluation plan to continuously assess effectiveness and utilization of all program offerings (camping, advancement, civic service, training)
- 6. By 2021 develop a comprehensive usage plan for all Council properties

Human Capital

Ambition: Recognized as the organization with the best trained and most engaged volunteer and staff leadership team in the communities we serve

Key Strategies:

- 1. Develop a comprehensive volunteer and staff development strategy resulting in enhanced capacity of council, districts, and units
- 2. Our adult volunteer and staff leadership will reflect the communities we serve
- 3. Provide tools to districts and units to help them more effectively achieve their missions

Metrics:

- By 2020 all Nominating Committees will include at least 2 diverse members and at least one member currently not in Scouting
- 2. By 2020 increase our community presence 15% annually by participating in community events to engage our presence and promote more community impact/influence
- 3. By 2020 develop a plan to provide adult leader training during program events
- 4. By 2020 develop strategies to strengthen on-boarding processes
- 5. By 2021 provide opportunities for distance learning
- 6. By 2021 offer a Council Leadership Coaching and Mentor Program to support growth, to sustain involvement, and invest in their role as volunteer leaders
- 7. By 2021 complete the 100% trained initiative
- 8. By 2021 develop a strategy for recruiting/retaining professional staff and volunteers
- 9. By 2023 create human capital development strategy for recruiting volunteers through the Scouting Alumni Association
- 10. Our district and council volunteer leadership and staff composition will evolve annually to more closely reflect the diverse communities we serve



Fund Development

Ambition: Secure financial resources to operate our organization in an environment of sustained growth

Key Strategies:

- 1. Communicate financial positions transparently
- 2. Establish a comprehensive operating, capital, and endowment fund development plan that includes well-designed and highly effective fundraising programs led by volunteers and guided by highly competent staff
- 3. Build council and district human capital for fundraising

Metrics:

- 1. By 2020 the first quarter report is available and available every quarter thereafter
- 2. Beginning in 2020 we will grow 10% in fundraising dollars and 10% number of donors and continue this growth annually
- 3. By 2020 we will publish a comprehensive fund and donor development plan
- 4. By 2020 we will have 100% of council and district Scouters participating at appropriate fundraising levels
- 5. By 2022 we will revise and update the plan and share best methods

This is a comprehensive plan, for sure, and a big bite to chew, but will position us for success moving forward. As we align to this new plan and begin working toward these goals, we will focus on a pyramid concept, not unlike Maslow's hierarchy of needs, where the council is the foundation, with districts above it. On top of districts will be units, and the pinnacle of the pyramid will be youth who experience the life changing benefits of Scouting. This concept, that the council is the foundation and supports districts first, and through districts units, and through units the Scouts will drive us toward extraordinary Scouting throughout the council.

To support and recognize districts working toward our new strategic plan, a tool was developed by Jacob Benyi (VP District Operations) with support from Davis Fox (Director of Field Service). Information on this recognition tool has been rolled out to district leadership and more information will be in the next newsletter. Stay tuned!



2020 COUNCIL OPERATING BUDGET APPROVED

At the December meeting of the council's Executive Board, Treasurer Peter Zipp presented the 2020 operating budget for approval. Work on the budget began in August at the Presidents Summit, where district leaders were trained on BSA accounting, best practices for budgeting, and the process whereby we would build the 2020 budget.

The first step was breaking down the overall budget into individual projects (we have 237 separate project codes) and getting that information in the hands of the volunteers and staff who have responsibility for them. Those volunteer/staff teams reviewed past history and built plans for 2020. These individual budgets were then aggregated into the overall council budget, which was reviewed in October by the Budget Committee; this group consisted of council committee chairs, Executive Board members, representatives from every district, and council management. Following their review and approval, the budget was reviewed and approved in November by the Executive Committee, and finally in December by the full Executive Board. The budget is set to net \$1 over expenses.

Our 2020 Operating Budget will include total expenses of \$4.75 million. This is a dramatic reduction from the past couple years; 2018 total expenses were\$6.55 million and 2019 are projected to end at \$5.2 million. For 2020 we will see the full realization of the reduction in force that occurred in April/May of 2019. We have

also completed a comprehensive study of business expenses which resulted in more than \$120,000 in annual expenses being identified and cut.

Employee-related costs, which include 29 full-time year-round staff, seasonal camp staff at R-C, Geronimo, and the Heard, and our ScoutReach program staff, will total \$2.2 million, or 47% of operating costs. The BSA standard is 65%, so we continue to operate with a smaller staff footprint than recommended.

In total, 88% of operations will support program and support of underprivileged youth in Scouting. 4% will cover management expenses and 8% fund raising. Of the fund-raising expense, a significant portion is the cost of prizes for Scouts in the popcorn sale. Breaking down the budget on a 'per youth' basis, our cost to operate will be about \$475 per youth member in 2020.


Highlights on the income side of the budget include:

- Camping and activity fee revenue of \$1.5 million
- Popcorn & Camp Cards (net of Cost of Goods Sold and Unit Commissions, but not including the cost of prizes which are covered by the council) of \$594,000
- United Way \$38,000
- Friends of Scouting of \$1.1 million

Kudos to Treasurer Peter Zipp and the many volunteers who contributed to building our 2020 budget.




2020 BUDGETED INCOME SOURCES

VISION 2040 FOR GRAND CANYON COUNCIL

This plan is our direction in moving us forward to ensure our program is not only built upon the fundamentals of Scouting, but also on the right trajectory focused on vision, to meet the needs of YOU, our Scouting families, our passionate volunteers. Our focus is to ensure that Boy Scouts of America in Grand Canyon Council is available to EVERY youth in EVERY community we serve! Key volunteer leaders and committees lead our 6 Districts. They are implementing the strategic plan pillar goals with every expectation to meet the key metrics that will reflect the successful implementation of our strategy.

It all boils down to effectively supporting our youth and our volunteers by providing the best training, leadership, growth opportunities, outdoor activities, and so much more for a positive future of our youth. And so today, one year later at the end of 2019, we are on the precipice of kicking off our strategy, our collaboration efforts and our energy-focused performance into high gear! Together we have an opportunity as a Council to come together and contribute our thoughts and ideas on how we want to move forward towards re-establishing ourselves as Arizona's preeminent youth development organization. 
- Have an online presence. Update your unit www.My.Scouting.org. This is how you can allow for online registration of youth too. Visit https://www.scouting.org/resources/online-registration/ for the latest information the abbreviated steps can be found at: https://www.grandcanyonbsa.org/update-your-beascout-pin
 - (Be sure to verify and/or update your pins information. To make sure possible families receive current information, units that have not had an edit in the six months leading up to re-charter will be archived untill the unit reactivates the pin.)
- Plan to recruit. Through council supported digital marketing, flyers, and other resources, each Scouting unit is asked to hold a recruitment drive this year.
 - Troops, just after or during cross-overs you have a new Scouts who are excited to share their adventure with friends. We will have resources for Troops by the February Roundtables to help prepare you to amplify your crossover and welcome new Scouts who may not have been in Cub Scouting.
 - Packs, as with all Scouting new Scouts are welcome year-round. There is a focused effort to welcome new
 Scouts at the start of the School year. With your feedback from last falls recruitment drive we continue to
 refine our process. Our focus with the recruitment drive will be the second and third week of School this
 fall. In April and May your district teams will be hosting orientations and helping set goals for the communities you plan to serve, the amount of youth and new adult leaders you plan to welcome in this fall.

UNIT PRESENTATIONS FOR COUNCIL AND DISTRICT UPDATES

All units are scheduling district volunteers to visit an upcoming meeting in January (some already took place in December) to share information about the state of the district and Council. Be sure to join us at your unit meeting to hear how Scouting served the community and your involvement helped our neighborhoods this year. NATIONAL EAGLE SCOUT SERVICE PROJECT OF THE YEAR AWARD



The National Eagle Scout Association established the national Eagle Scout service project of the year award to recognize valuable service of an exceptional nature through completion of an Eagle Scout project. The council NESA committee selects a recipient for their respective council from the list of submitted

nominations and then forwards a worthy candidate to the National Eagle Scout Association for regional consideration. Applications are due to the <u>Council Service Center</u> no later than January 21, 2020. The award will be presented on February 8, 2020 at <u>the Council Recognition Dinner</u>. An Eagle Scout, parents, or any registered BSA volunteer (with the Eagle Scout's permission) may submit the Eagle Scout service project for consideration.

You must use the Eagle Scout Service Project of the Year Nomination Form and include a copy of the Eagle Scout Service Project workbook. The more information you can give the nominating committee, the better your chance of being recognized for the award. Examples of projects that have been selected for the award include projects that have benefited underprivileged children, recognized veterans, been international in nature, and have required significant time and resources.

TEMPORARY EAGLE EXTENSION FOR NEW SCOUTS

Who is eligible? Any young man or young woman who joined a Scouts BSA troop in 2019, and was at least 16 but not yet 18 on Scouts BSA launch day: Feb. 1, 2019.

2020 EAGLE SCOUT RANK APPLICATION PROCEDURES

On December 31, 2019, the LDS Church is discontinuing Scouting as their youth program. Some units' adult and youth members will continue their Scouting journey in a new unit or with a new chartered organization. Some questions have been raised on how to handle perspective Eagle Scout rank applications for current Scouts in an LDS chartered unit. The short answer is that applications will be handled the same as they are today. Scouts must be registered in a unit to complete all requirements except for the Eagle Board of Review and turning in the paperwork.

Scouts who are no longer in a unit and need an Eagle Board after January 1, 2020, we ask that the final Eagle Board of Review occur before the end of February 2020. For Scouts whose Eagle application process may not be complete and paperwork turned into council prior to the unit's charter expiring (March 1, 2020), please notify the Council's Eagle application processor, Kathy Coleman (602 955-7747 Ext. 223) of the pending expiration and application submittal. 





